INTRODUCTION

Tony Waite is operating in Kariba urban and peri urban in wards 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 8, and 12. Tony Waite Organisation interventions envision holistic approach in caring and providing welfare of the affected children, youths, men and women. The organization has continued focusing on women's health in wards 2 and 3 where more ward meetings are taking place. Secondary caregivers and church leaders are cascading the programme in wards.

PROJECT TARGET

The organization interventions target children in need of care, youths, adults and the elderly. Equal opportunity is being addressed across the board.






B) MEDICAL SUPPORT


A total 1 668 (779M 889F) were reached for the quarter with SRHR. Volunteers and church leaders continue to provide services in PMTCT. Church leaders also continue to play a crucial role in counseling and giving education on PMTCT. A total of 118 couples were reached with counseling, 96 (48M 48F) youths were counseled, 107 (40M 67F) actual number of people going for HTC and 499 (246M 253F) reached with SRHR education. The organisation managed to train 29 youths out of school and one youth officer on Sexual Reproductive Health and rights. There were 16 males and 14 females. Youths in school and youths out of school are now disseminating information on SRHR to their peers in the community. The graph overleaf shows the trends of the YOS and YIS achievements during the quarter.



SAT MAPPING VERIFICATION EXERCISE

Southern African AIDS Trust came for verification of the mapping exercise. Stakeholders were engaged in the mapping verification. During the TB mapping focus group discussions a lot of issues were raised by people in the community. They cited nutritional support to TB patients as a matter which needs to be revised by organisations. This is because the TB drugs need to be taken after food so a lot of patients end up defaulting because they will be without the food. Another issue also was the dissemination of information on TB. Challenges highlighted included low male involvement in PMTCT, late treatment seeking behavior especially in hard to reach areas, lack of information on TB and SRHR and that microscopists were there but there were no microscopes. It was established that there was need for information dissemination in all wards.

3. PSYCHOSOCIAL SUPPORT

Youth clubs and support groups continue to meet in their clubs. They participated in the youths gala organized by ZNFPC and the Anti sexual violence campaign that the organization partnered with the Zimbabwe Republic Police, They disseminated information on Child rights and abuse through song and poems. ANTI SEXUAL VIOLENCE CAMPAIGN LAUNCH

An anti-sexual violence campaign was carried out in partnership with Zimbabwe Republic Police Kariba (ZRP). The event was a success in the community of Kariba as many people thronged the open space by the shopping centre to get information. The event was graced by politburo member and provincial delegates. The different stakeholders present highlighted the importance of doing away with sexual violence against women and girls as it resulted in them suffering from sexually transmitted infections and unintended pregnancies. The Executive Director Miss Vengere spoke on behalf of Civil Society community in Kariba and castigated sexual violence perpetrators and implored on those enforcing the law to do their duty as the organisation was doing its part.

GENDER BASED VIOLENCE AND SRHR BASELINE SURVEY

The organisation in partnership with HOSPAZ carried out a GBV & SRHR baseline survey using key informant interviews and focus group discussions. The concerns highlighted reveal that even men were also being subjected to GBV but they had no faith in going to report as they felt the law favored women. They also feared society would laugh at them as being weak. They went on to highlight that they are regarded with disbelief and not taken seriously by the law enforcement agencies when they made the steps to report GBV. The women were blaming the issue of extra marital affairs by men as contributing to prevalence of GBV. It was implored on the organisation to disseminate information and conduct door to door counseling visits on GBV. There was also an outcry to have the community educated on what the law says on GBV and how the cases are handled.

3) TO PROVIDE COMPREHENSIVE LEGAL AND SCHOLASTIC SUPPORT

The organization continues to support to one student at Solusi University and another at Kwekwe Polytechnic by paying tuition and other basic allowances. One male student has since graduated and was assisted with funds to get started in South Africa where he was offered a job by a division of Econet Zimbabwe. The Org also took on board three new students doing motor mechanics, earth moving and a degree in rural development and 4 from primary school had their fees paid for making a total of 10 students. They also assisted in 4 legal cases with the aid of Antonio and Associates legal practitioner who partnered with the organization.

4) CAPACITY BUILDING PROJECT

ISAL groups continue to get financial support through the revolving loan fund. A total of seven groups managed to benefit during the quarter with some having progressed as far as the third cycle. This is working well as evidenced by some groups approaching the organisation to also get trained and benefit from the revolving loan fund. This has also helped some women be established in income generating projects where they are now contributing to the family's

upkeep. The marketing officer had an opportunity to display kapenta product at the NANGO expo
