JULY 2016 MONTHLY REPORT

INTRODUCTION

Tony Waite has continued to scale up its operations from urban, peri-urban and hard to reach areas. The organization also continues to thrive offering a robust and holistic package of philanthropic assistance to children infected and affected by chronic illnesses orphans and the vulnerable, men and women, boys and girls in the community.

- To provide Care and Support Services and Palliative Care.

Outreaches for hard to reach areas

1. IDENTIFICATION OF NEEDY COMMUNITY MEMBERS

Trained volunteers continued to identify people in need of care. These people include women, men, boys and girls seeking medical assistance, school fees, nutritional support and others having suffered Gender Based Violence.

2. TO IMPROVE HOUSEHOLD INCOME, FOOD SECURITY AND HEALTH


NUTRITIONAL SUPPORT

The organization has continued to create strong synergies and networking with local stakeholders and donors with the bid to offer nutritional support to the needy in the community. The organization managed to reach 289 (155M 134F) through the feed programme during the month. A total of 78 (46M 32F) orphans and vulnerable children were reached with kapenta during the month courtesy of the organization's kapenta project whilst 211 (109M 102F) were reached with fish heads.

MEDICAL SUPPORT

A total of 3 841 (1 649M 2 192F) were reached with SRHR information which led to a total of 212 (75M 137F) getting tested for HIV and knowing their statuses. The figure comprises those reached through the Women and child health project, in school and workplace outreaches and those reached in youth clubs. Secondary caregivers continue to spread the gospel through ward meetings which resulted in 40 couples being reached with PMTCT information and individuals reaching to 418 (71M 347F) through door to door counseling sessions. Volunteers have managed to offer assistance to 99(21M 78F) individuals on GBV and these were assisted through counseling and referrals depending on need. Tony Waite volunteers have also managed to give TB adherence support to 39 (21M 18F) individuals. Church leaders continue to intervene in Women's health, new born and child health. They managed to reach 13 couples and 61(19M 42F) individuals with counseling. They also managed to reach 45(19M 26) youths with counseling and SRHR information. Youths in school peer educators managed to reach a total of 1 639 (878M 761F) with SRHR education and counseling whilst 41 (20M 21F) went for HIV testing. They also reported 12 cases of emotional abuse which they referred to their teachers for counseling. See graph overleaf in comparison of figures reached. Volunteers in Blue and Church leaders in Red

The PMTCT mothers’ meetings are ongoing at Nyamhunga Clinic with the PMTCT champion spearheading the discussions and sharing testimonies.

SRHR EDUCATION

A total of 210 (50M 160F) were reached during the month with information on HIV testing and counseling at Methodist church. The organization also managed to reach 40 (30M 10F) youths at Salvation Army church with information on HIV and Cancer. See photos below



The organization continues working hand in glove with other organizations and this has ensured cooperation which has assisted the disadvantaged and the underprivileged.

Volunteers continue to conduct home visits to Community Home Based Care clients and support visits were done.

OUTREACHES

Tony Waite Organization in partnership with the Ministry of Health and Child Welfare has continued to offer services in Hard to reach areas and for the month of July the organization managed to conduct the outreach at NAU, and Charara. The outreaches provided the opportunity for provision of services which include Health education on family planning, PMTCT and HIV. Services offered included ante natal care, treatment of minor illness for instance diarrhea diseases, HIV testing and counseling, ART resupply, contraceptives, growth monitoring and child immunization. In giving education Miss Muchenje encouraged personal hygiene and

boiling water to purify it before taking it as it was apparent that most people were presenting with diarrhea

LIVELIHOODS PROJECTS

The organization operates in three livelihoods gardens namely Padare, ZIHOPFE and Charara in a bid to improve nutritional support and household income. The garden members, their families and the community at large benefit from these gardens through availability of fresh vegetables for consumption and sale. Charara garden is doing extremely well and are nursing tomatoes and onions whilst they are selling green leafy vegetables (covo). They are fully utilizing their space to draw maximum benefits from their garden. Plans are underway to venture into poultry production as well. At Padare garden they are selling tsunga and covo whilst at ZIHOPHE they harvesting tsunga whilst also nursing other varieties of green leafy vegetables. 3) PSYCHOSOCIAL SUPPORT

Youth clubs and support groups are continuing to meet once per month holding their meetings at Nyamhunga and Mahombekombe. A total of 261 (131M 130F) have been reached during the month of July. They continue getting information on SRHR, Gender Based Violence, hygiene, child abuse, rights and responsibilities. Three groups continue to be actively engaging in their ISAL where they are engaging in various buying and selling activities to raise funds like selling of fruits, recharge cards, vegetable stalls, kapenta, sweets and snacks. Batanai ISAL group tops the list in doing their savings.

DONOR VISITS

The organization was graced with a monitoring visit from United States African Development Foundation and LEAD to check on progress of the kapenta project versus the targets that were set at the beginning of the project. They conducted on sight visits for various beneficiaries of the project and they also visited the site on which Tony Waite is constructing the kapenta factory. See photos below of the team viewing progress of the factory construction and later

meeting a beneficiary of the revolving loan fund who has progressed well and has now established a shop at Quarry



The organization also got a visit from Wayne Robertson who is supporting with education funds and livelihood projects. He was pleased with the progress being made and the impact of the projects especially at Charara garden.

KAPENTA PROJECT

The organization has also continued to support vulnerable women and youths economically through income generating project of Kapenta. A total of 16(12F 4M) were employed during the month comprising of youths and women some of whom are survivors of gender based violence, are caring for children with disabilities and some of the women are also living with disabilities. Markets that have been opened continue placing orders but there is need to open new more markets as to get more meaningful results.

KAPENTA PROCESSING FACTORY CONSTRUCTION

The organization continues with the construction of the kapenta packaging and processing factory with filling up of the box. See photos below



4) TO PROVIDE COMPREHENSIVE LEGAL AND SCHOLASTIC SUPPORT

The organization has continued to support Orphans and Vulnerable Children in the community scholastically. Fees and upkeep support were paid for two male students at Midlands State University and Great Zimbabwe University. During the month the organization managed to buy uniforms, jerseys and shoes for 25 (4M 21F) primary school students. On the organization' mandate to keep girls safe in school 11 girls benefitted from Nyanhewe primary school and

they got the uniforms, shoes and socks. Mahombekombe Primary had 13 (4M 9F) students benefitting uniforms, shoes and jersey whilst 1 male student benefitted from Nyamhunga Primary school.
