## 1. IDENTIFICATION OF NEEDY COMMUNITY MEMBERS

Trained volunteers continued to identify people in need of care. These people include women, men, boys and girls seeking medical assistance, school fees, nutritional support and others having suffered Gender Based Violence.

## 2. TO IMPROVE HOUSEHOLD INCOME, FOOD SECURITY AND HEALTH

### NUTRITIONAL SUPPORT

The organization has continued to create strong synergies and networking with local stakeholders and donors with the bid to offer nutritional support to the needy in the community. Fish heads were distributed during the month where a total of 238 (120M 118F) benefitted from the feed programme. Rural schools have expressed need for relish for the school feeding programme and kapenta was distributed to Manhanga primary benefiting 233 (102m 131f) There has been a rise in babies needing infant milk formula so stakeholders are being requested to help with funds for the milk.

### MEDICAL SUPPORT

A total of 2 018 (680M 1 338F) were reached with SRHR information which led to a total of 421 (106M 315) getting tested for HIV and knowing their statuses. The figure comprises those reached through the Women and child health project and those reached in youth clubs, ward meetings, home visits and on one session. Secondary caregivers continue to spread the gospel through ward meetings which resulted in 222(164M 58F) being reached with PMTCT information. Volunteers have managed to reach 301 (92M 209F) with GBV information and managed to offer assistance to 61(3M 58F) individuals on GBV. They were offered counselling with 3 females being referred to the VFU and 2 females to social services. Tony Waite volunteers have also managed to give TB adherence support to 13 (3m 9f) individuals. The organization continues working hand in glove with other organizations and this has ensured cooperation which has assisted the dis advantaged and the under privileged.


## **OUTREACHES**

Integrated outreaches for the month were done at Quarry, NAU, Charara, Fothergill and Nyaodza as well as Makande. This was done in partnership with ministry of health and child care. The aim was to contribute towards the 90 90 90 targets and at the same time providing sexual reproductive health services to these people in hard to reach areas. The team offered the following services i.e. immunizations, family planning, HIV counselling and testing services, growth monitoring, dispensing ART, and treatment of minor ailments and VIAC. Health education was given where they were taught on condom use. There was overwhelming attendance at Fothergill where they had not received services during the previous month. Kudzanayi received an outstanding turn out where people were mainly complaining of cough and pneumonia. Turnout was lower than the previous month at Hwamira and Chitete due to mix up of dates as well as that people assumed since it was a public holiday the outreach team would not be working. ## LIVELIHOODS PROJECTS

The organization operates in four livelihoods gardens namely Padare, ZIHOPFE and Charara and primary school in a bid to improve nutritional support and household income through availability of fresh vegetables for consumption they are fully utilizing their space to draw maximum benefits from their garden. Padare garden has nursed green leafy vegetables as the winter season approaches temperatures will be cooler and they are expecting to do well. At Charara garden for PLWHIV and the school garden they have nursed green leafy

### SEWING PROJECT

The project continues with sanitary wear production with publicity being done through local radio stations and face book. It has generated a lot of interest from the local community. The girls and women are soldiering on with the project though sales have been very low during the month. Miss Vengere mobilised women leveraging on the feed programme at the organisation where she highlighted the benefits of the community supporting the sewing project. She also informed women who were present that if they wanted to join the project they could register and also come to join since it was a project to benefit the community. See photos below

### **PSYCHOSOCIAL SUPPORT**

Youth clubs and support groups are continuing to meet once per month holding their meetings at Nyamhunga and Mahombekombe. A total of 234 (128M 104F) have been reached during the month of May. They continue getting information on SRHR, Gender Based Violence, hygiene, child abuse, rights and responsibilities. They requested for psychosocial support camps and exchange visits. They also highlighted the plight of not having a nurse at the youth centre as they noted it was affecting them a lot as adolescents.

### **KAPENTA PROJECT**

The organization has also continued to support vulnerable women and youths economically through income generating project of Kapenta. A total of 31 (19M 12F) were employed during the month comprising of youths and women some of whom are survivors of gender based violence, are caring for children with disabilities and some of the women are also living with disabilities. The organisation also made a donation of 30kgs kapenta to the school feeding programme benefitting 233 (102M 131F) at Manhanga Primary school.
